NARRATIVE: The shooter was target shooting at the L.T. Murray Wildlife Area when his firearm exploded. Investigation revealed that the sabot was not properly seated on the powder charge, with roughly a one-inch gap between the projectile and the powder charge. In addition to burns on the face, the victim suffered shrapnel wounds as the burst muzzleloader embedded in the forearm and broke one bone, causing both bleeding and minor nerve damage.

CAUSE: Defective ammunition; careless handling in loading the muzzleloader

The shotgun discharged when the dog stepped on the trigger, discharging the gun into the victim's lower right leg, just 12 inches from the muzzle. Investigation revealed the safety functioned properly.

The father served as a blocker, preventing the birds from escaping, while the older brother served as a driver, hunting a brushy creek below the other three hunters. A quail flushed and the shooter fired, wounding his brother who was obscured by brush although only 18 yards away.

After reading in the local newspaper that an unknown shooter had shot a brush picker, the victim contacted investigating officers the next day and explained the shooting incident from his perspective.

The discharge struck the victim in the right ear.
